## The Love Letter Ceremony

Also known as a wine box ceremony, this tradition is about creating a little time capsule of love. Before the wedding, we each wrote a letter sharing our hopes and dreams for one another. During the ceremony, those letters are sealed in a box, to be opened on our first anniversary. When we read them, we'll also write new letters to add back in—building a collection to revisit on future anniversaries.

We chose this unity ritual because it felt like such a sweet, meaningful way to keep celebrating our wedding day year after year, reminding us not only of where we began, but how far we've come together.

## The Handfasting Ceremony

Handfasting is an ancient Celtic tradition that symbolizes the physical and spiritual union of two people. By literally "tying the knot," the couple's joined hands are bound with cords to represent their commitment and intent to walk through life together.

We chose this ritual because it connects Lisa to her Irish roots, and because we loved the idea of being tied together in a symbolic, heartfelt way since we aren't doing the legal piece of a wedding. Our cords are blue and silver—colors that represent trust, loyalty, forgiveness, kindness, and honest communication—values we strive to live by every day.

# The Oathing Stone

Rooted in Scottish tradition, the Oathing Stone was once held by couples as they made their vows, symbolizing strength, permanence, and a bond as enduring as stone. In modern ceremonies, it's often reimagined as a way to "set vows in stone" while creating a keepsake to carry forward together.

In our ceremony, the stone will also be passed among our guests, inviting each person to hold it and silently add their love, blessings, or well-wishes. We chose this ritual not only for its meaning and tradition, but also because it gives our loved ones a chance to share in the promises we're making and become part of the foundation we're building together.
